A project to bring together youngsters and seniors for social innovation

The <u>ComeON!</u> project has been developed within the framework of **Grundtvig Multilateral Projects**, according to the following priorities:

- acquisition of key competences through adult education
- Creativity and innovation, including **intergenerational learning**, learning for senior citizens and family learning.

ComeON! will focus on equipping senior citizens with the skills that they need in order to cope with change and remain active in society, and developing innovative approaches to intergenerational learning and strengthening the contribution of older people to the learning of others, including young adults.

The project in its **first step** developed a Desk Review of the Literature on Intergenerational Learning, Social Innovation and Volunteerism involving Old and Young

People.

Examples of Good Practice

Approach of The Princess Margarita of Romania Foundation

The elderly people isolated in care homes or at house enjoy the company of the young volunteers they meet weekly in the project **Volunteers** – **Ambassadors of Change**. A walk in the park, a chess game, a birthday party or recalling different moments from the past are ways in which the young people and elders can meet and engage

in dialogue.

At Generations Community Centre from district 6th, Bucharest, you can see

children and elderly people that paint together, youngsters that learn English language, old people that write their memories and, with the help of the volunteers, introduce them into the computer. In a joyful and dynamic atmosphere, the elderly succeed to forget their loneliness and isolation, to feel useful and "get sick" with the youngsters optimism. At **Senior's Club**, grandparents read the press, play chess or rummy, help the little ones by teaching them and learn new things. At the **Hope Hairdresser** old people enjoy the care and attention of our young volunteer stylists. For old people, a few hours at the hairdresser's represent an episode of normality which makes them feel more respected and active and a meaningful part of the society they live in.

Granny's Finest

Granny's Finest is a social fashion label made by seniors in collaboration with young creative people.

This **intergenerational project** was launched in 2011 in the **Netherlands** with two main objectives:

- 1. Addressing loneliness among elderly by organizing weekly knitting clubs. Here the "grannies" can meet new friends with the same hobby and feel proud of being active and creative.
- **2.** Helping **young artists**. Creative people can create beautiful products, but they are not always commercially savvy. This initiative helps them in building up a professional portfolio of products.

The young designers provide the patterns and the grannies knit their creations with 100% natural yarns. After they finish the product they write a personal message on the label. Every customer writes a **postcard back to the granny** to thank her. Sustainability of the initiative is ensured through the generation of moneys from the sale of the products produced, and the **long term relationships** that are established **between the 'grannies' and the designers**.
